SERVICE-LEARNING PROJECT IDEAS

- 1. Start an information campaign for a health or preventative topic
- 2. Establish a club to help an elderly neighbor
- Write stories about the history of your town for your newspaper or students in younger grades
- 4. Paint over graffiti
- 5. Plan a drug-free club for your school
- 6. Create a public service announcement (PSA)
- 7. Produce an anti-crime, anti-drug, anti-violence play and perform it for others
- 8. Create and distribute a list of hotlines or agency links for kids who might need help
- 9. Create a hotline for kids who might need help
- 10. Research the need to reduce litter inside and outside your school or other public areas and propose solutions
- 11. Plan low-maintenance garden on school grounds or other public areas
- 12. Make posters or collages that promote tolerance and understanding of difference. Post them in your school. Start a club to promote peace and tolerance
- 13. Plan and host an Ethnic Awareness week
- 14. Find, interview, and write histories of diverse people in your community
- 15. Volunteer to tutor students who need help with academic work or social skills
- 16. Make New Kid Survival Kits for new students to your school
- 17. Learn and create a program to teach about good nutrition
- 18. Interview seniors and report on personal histories, communities, and stories of character
- 19. Make gift baskets and deliver to seniors
- 20. Help disadvantage children make gifts to give to others
- 21. Collect shoes, eyeglasses, etc. for children in a third world country
- 22. Purchase or write children's books to read or give away to children in hospitals
- 23. Make "I Care" kits for the homeless shelter in your community
- 24. Hold a clothing drive and deliver items to the homeless shelter
- 25. Prepare and serve food at the homeless shelter
- 26. Create a cookbook for sell and donate receipts to charity
- 27. Hold a clothing drive to provide for local charity
- 28. Hold a used book sale. Donate money to library or literacy group
- 29. Collect used and new books to give to the hospital, nursing home shelter or preschool
- 30. Read aloud to a person who is visually impaired
- 31. Organize a reading hour for children at your school or library
- 32. Make reading or math flash cards for primary students
- 33. Set up a buddy system at your school for kids with special needs
- 34. Fundraise for Braille books for the visually impaired
- 35. Organize a public issues forum for speakers for local political office

- 36. Hold after-school classes to younger latchkey students
- 37. Create a play that teaches young children how to stay safe at home while parents are away
- 38. Make a flyer of after school safety tips for young children
- 39. Organize a first-aid training session for your school, club, or community
- 40. Create a video on holiday safety tips
- 41. Sing, perform a play, give a magic show, host a dance, or play an instrument for senior citizens
- 42. Research your community and write a children's book with a younger student of the community
- 43. Write stories and story questions to read to younger children
- 44. Hold an "Elderfair" at a local senior center
- 45. Become pen pals with residents of the local senior center
- 46. Create a time capsule with items from students and senior citizens
- 47. Work with senior citizens to create a "then and now" book on themes such as school, childhood games, work, recreation, food, music, etc.
- 48. Create "need to know" packets for students coming into next year's class
- 49. Create teaching aids for a nearby day care
- 50. Start a bird sanctuary. Build birdfeeders, plant trees, write journal entries about birds for younger grades
- 51. Create a student-run conference on a topic. Have booths, breakout sessions and speakers
- 52. Establish long-term service programs that future classes can continue
- 53. Develop booklets on cultures within your school or community. Give them to the library and the Chamber of Commerce
- 54. Translate town pamphlets and flyers into other languages to help community members who do not speak English
- 55. Organize and host an event to prepare students making the transition to (middle school, high school, college)
- 56. Study traffic patterns and accident reports for roads around the school to evaluate safety issues
